

Why is it called the Best Dam Bike Ride?

In the year that saw the first Apple Macintosh, welcomed the Summer Olympics to Los Angeles and asked TV audiences "Where's the Beef?", Bike MS: Best Dam Bike Ride debuted.

What would grow to become one of the most successful bike fundraisers in the country took its name from the town of Beaver Dam, which was the overnight stop for the two-day ride in those early years. Back then participants rode 75 miles each day, slept on the floor of a local grade school and snacked on "gorp," a mixture of raisins, nuts and sesame seed sticks.

The focus then was as it is now: to create the best bike tour experience possible.
